
So far we have collected \$2,952 towards our goal of five ELCA Good Gifts farms. At \$715 per farm, this is a little over four farms. Only \$623 to go!




The church office will be closed on Friday, December 22nd and Monday, December 25th.

We find ourselves in life's special Season of Hope, and many of us turn our thoughts to the kinder side of life. Kinder eyes to see the vulnerabilities of life. And how we all can answer this urgent question: what are we doing today for others?

So many of us wonder in our own hearts and minds if we have much of anything to offer. But we all have something to offer. Just about different things and in different ways. The purpose of this small story is to help us appreciate the large impact we all can make when we choose to help another who on most other days would be out of our line of vision. An important component of this Season of Hope is the hope we bring to even the most humble of people. If we choose to see them. We have no real idea of the good we can do.

Kindness requires no pedigree, or degree with ancient letters, which forecasts the good all of us can do. No gift is too small, as the writings and songs of the season tell us. Just be good for goodness' sake, as our mothers encouraged us to be long ago.

And in the process maybe we begin to find our path to feed that pesky hunger for purpose we all seek in our own lives as well.

One of the most beloved songs of this season is about the humblest of gifts, The Little Drummer Boy. All the young boy has to offer is his simple song. In its revealing ending, it is the smallest of gifts which is exalted the highest in the Heavens. One of our faith's sweetest twists, and the point of it all.

WHAT I HAVE LEARNED ABOUT LIFE ON THE WAY TO THE COURTHOUSE IS THIS: we are all problem solvers for others. You do yourself—and others—a disservice if you do not step out a bit and take more chances to serve others. A chance you can help everyday citizens try to shed the tug and pull of some of life's everyday problems, no matter how ordinary and routine those problems may seem to you. Or how ordinary you feel what you have to offer may be.

Wordsworth understood their importance, calling small acts of our helping hands "little unremembered acts of kindness." We will not get our name up in lights but isn't that the point? Kindness is calibrated in different ways, and sometimes it is sweetly measured out one letter at a time, or in another act of kindness in the disguise of a seemingly ordinary thing.

And in our own imperfect way maybe we make good on our long-ago promise to our moms to be good for goodness' sake, too
