

Dear Epiphany Partners,

February is a busy month at Epiphany. I'll get right to some of what we've got going on and want to invite you to be a part of:

Sunday, February 5: Epiphany welcomes Pastor Todd Cutter as our guest teacher during Encounter: Faith and guest preacher during worship. Pastor Cutter is the campus pastor at Lenoir-Rhyne University, our Lutheran college in Hickory. During Encounter: Faith he will be talking about the trends related to spiritual and religious life he is seeing on college campuses with our young adults.

Saturday, February 11: Denise Henry, Epiphany member, is being ordained to the office of pastor at 2:00 pm at Epiphany. She has accepted a call as a chaplain at our area Lutheran nursing homes, Trinity Glen and Trinity Elms. This is a special occasion in the life of the church, and I hope you can attend. A light reception follows the worship service.

Sunday, February 12: The Rev. Dr. David Brondos and his beloved wife, Alicia, will be at Epiphany as our special guests. They were supposed to be at Epiphany earlier this summer, but a positive COVID diagnosis required a change in plans. Epiphany has sponsored the ministry of Dr. Brondos for many years as he teaches as a professor at a seminary in Mexico City. During the Encounter: Faith time, they will talk about their work in Mexico, and we will hear Dr. Brondos preach in worship. After being at Epiphany, Dr. and Mrs. Brondos will be heading to Christ's Beloved Community to visit with the community there.

Sunday, February 19: *Bold Women's Sunday.* On Transfiguration Sunday, we give God thanks for the witness of women throughout the years. Pastor Julie O'Neal from Burkhead United Methodist Church and Pastor Russell will be doing a pulpit swap that Sunday.

During Encounter: Faith, we will be welcoming Gabriella Drouillard-Moser as our guest teacher. She is a local therapist and has expertise in the intersection of faith and mental health. Her teaching will be great preparation for Lent, which begins the following week.

Tuesday, February 21: Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. We'll gather for pancakes and other delicious breakfast foods at 6:00 pmon Shrove Tuesday. After dinner, we'll burn the palms from last year's Palm Sunday and use those ashes for worship on Ash Wednesday.

Wednesday, February 22: Ash Wednesday worship at 12:00 and 7:00. We'll gather to mark the beginning of Lent with prayers for repentance and renewal, the imposition of ashes on our foreheads, and the Eucharist.

There's always a lot going on at Epiphany. Thanks for the ways you help to make ministry happen in this place!

Sunday, February 12th is the big game, but here at Epiphany, kids will be getting their game faces ready for the Super Bowl of Caring! All children and youth are invited to stay after worship in the Narthex to help collect money for hunger relief in our community. We will provide children with pots and cans to collect the congregation's noisy offering. Please see Lauren Saldaña if you have any questions.



There will be a movie night for all children on **Sunday**, **February 19th at 6:00 PM in the Fellowship Hall**. Come in your pajamas and prepare to get cozy! Children can bring pillows, blankets, sleeping bags, or a comfy portable chair to sit on. We will have popcorn and drinks available. This is a drop off event, but parents are welcome to stay and enjoy the movie with us.

Augsburg Lutheran Church and Lutheran Church of the Epiphany, in partnership with Lutheridge Camp in Arden, NC, will host Lutheroad Day Camp on June 12-16, 2023. Lutheroad is open to all children who are currently completing kindergarten through 5th grade. It will be staffed with college-age counselors from Lutheridge, trained in youth ministry, who will act as program leaders and counselors for the campers. Campers will be involved in Bible studies, recreation, small groups, worship, crafts, games, and service projects. The daily schedule will be Monday-Thursday 9:00-4:00, and Friday 9:00-12:00. Campers attending Lutheroad will need to bring a lunch each day, and a water bottle. Snacks will be provided each day. On Thursday evening, Augsburg will host an Ice Cream Social where the campers will showcase what they have learned throughout the week. On Friday, camp ends before lunch at 12:00.

Lutheroad will take place at Augsburg Lutheran Church this year (845 West 5th Street, Winston-Salem, NC 27101). Please let Lauren Saldaña (lsaldana@epiphanyws.org) know if transportation will be a challenge.

Because we are partnering with Augsburg this year, we are able to significantly reduce registration costs! **Registration is only \$50.00 per camper**, and due at the time of registration (a huge bargain for a week-long camp). EECC Looking to the Future in 2023

The preschool years have a special role to play in a child's growth and

development. Many of the patterns for learning, growth, and for later social success are laid down in the preschool years. However, the big difference between a preschool program and later school curricula lies in the way young children learn.

We firmly believe that young children learn not so much through being taught (filling a bucket), as by exploration and experimenting with actual objects and by having concrete experiences (lighting a fire). For example, a child learns the concept of round not by having someone tell him/her what is or what it looks like but by holding and touching, playing with objects, and comparing, drawing and cutting around shapes. Research shows that young children learn best through experimentation. Spoken language follows thought and activity rather than being separate from it. This process of encouraging learning that is appropriate to the child's age and stage of development is called "developmentally appropriate practice" by the National Association for Education of Young Children or NAEYC. This is also our approach to early education as we will make available a rich variety of materials, as well as encourage hands-on activities that give children the opportunity to explore the world around them in many ways.

The congregation of Lutheran Church of the Epiphany has always been a huge supporter for the preschool. We currently serve 50 children, 18 months to 5 years. We are providing a partial scholarship for one family and scholarships through Smart Start and DSS are accepted for those who need extra help. We have an optional year available for students who miss the cut off for public school or need another year of growth before Kindergarten.

We always welcome the gift of your time and talents to the preschool, as well as, donations of consumable supplies, snack foods, teacher resources. Thank you all for your continued care, prayers and support.

Fabulous February Food Ministries at Epiphany!

Updates from Outreach Committee on Food Ministries:

We are now serving 117 students at Ibraham Elementary for the weekend food bag program. Added three more students since the first of the year!

We have served 12-15 families at the Ibraham food pantry twice a month touching almost 150 people each month! We distributed eggs in January in addition to two food bags! You know how expensive eggs are, so getting a dozen eggs at our pantry enables each family to stretch their \$\$!!

Our CBC "work team" shows up several times a month at Christ's Beloved Community driving UHaul rental trucks, unloading trucks and loading freezers and shelves, and helping to distribute food!

THANKS to all the Sunday morning "packers" who are so diligent! We have a double delivery to pack on Sunday Feb. 12th. We will need extra hands that morning and a couple extra cars/trucks to deliver these boxes on Tuesday and Wednesday that week.

Holy Light, Holy Darkness

In the strictest sense, white is the absence of color. You can't mix any colors together to get white. Conversely, black is the sum of all colors—what you obtain by mixing all colors on the spectrum together. Now many of you know what I look like. Very light complexion. So much so that I've laughed through the 40+ years I've known my mother-in-law because, as often as not, the first thing she says when she sees me (usually to Wendy) is "Tim's color wasn't good!" Or to me directly, "Tim, are you okay? You look so pale!" For 20 years I responded simply, "No, I think I'm okay, really." But for the past 20 years I usually just say, "Nana. Look at me. These are my people." The colorless ones.

I'm not being entirely frivolous here. Polarities of colorless vs. colorful, white vs. black, and light vs. dark abound in our culture. Trouble is, dominant cultures always define what any simple realities mean. Even worse, dominant and oppressive cultures assign value to one or the other side of analogies and opposites. I knew by the time I was four that the cowboys in the white hats were the good guys, and those in the dark hats were the bad guys. That's how we were taught to see things. Likewise skin tones. Light skin or clothing is *fair* or *pure*, like Snow White. Dark is evil. Think Maleficent or Darth Vader.

We are coming to realize as both culture and church that these stereotypes are not only not helpful, they are at their most insidious (even if subconsciously) purveyors of White privilege and supremacy. I can lecture until I'm blue in the face about the baptismal garment derivation of the liturgical *alb*—literally translated "white"—that resurged in the liturgical renewal of the 1960s. That it signifies purity and baptism from the (all-White) European church. It's even biblical, as in the Transfiguration or in Revelation's crowd dressed in white robes who have been through great tribulation and have been washed in the blood of the lamb. But white robes too often mean terror for people who don't look like me.

And then there's the season of the church year nearly upon us. Epiphany. Revealed. Made manifest. It juxtaposes light and darkness. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." Or even the star that the Magi follow to Jesus. But consider this. Light isn't the only thing that reveals; in fact, too much light blinds. Stars, including the Bethlehem star, are not visible during the day. That is to say that night, or darkness, is what reveals them. It's not "light good, dark bad." It is light/darkness in tandem, as Genesis reminds us. "There was evening and there was morning, the first day." Creation itself, like the seed in the dark earth, germinates in the darkness. A new life grows in the darkness of the womb.

The thing about light is that its reflection is what allows us to see any and all color. Including, of course, black, which again IS the sum of all color. As <u>Steven Thorngate notes in The Christian Century</u> (Dec. 2022, p. 58), "Many Christians would like to excise light/dark from our liturgical text—or at least exclude them from new ones—and for pretty persuasive reasons." I commend his observations to you for pondering and discussing—his assertion that "Light/dark language is elemental. Can we embrace its richness while also seeking to avoid the harm it can do?" He offers six guidelines for consideration in using light/dark imagery and juxtaposition.

Like so many things as a White man in a dominant (White) culture, I am finding new struggle with Epiphany imagery and I resonate with Thorngate's six considerations to help guide our processing of how we cause no harm through imagery to which the dominant culture assigns pejorative connotations. Not easy work, but necessary. I also commend to you the recent book *God's Holy Darkness* by Sharei Green and Beckah Selnick. It's appropriate for all ages, children to adults, to help us lift up the beauty and necessity of darkness as part of God's good creation and rhythm of nature itself, night and day.

As a baby step this Epiphany, contemplate that as brilliant as the star that led the Magi to Jesus may have been, they never could have seen it except at night—holy light made visible by holy darkness that in contrast and interplay become a beautiful part of God's glorious creation. At the very least, be aware and careful with language. Remind folks that white = no color, and black = all color. While both have power and purpose, the greatest beauty is the intricate interplay and contrast of the whole spectrum—both poles and everything in between.
