Dear Epiphany Members,

Thank you to everyone who attended the January 28 Annual Meeting. Here are the highlights of the meeting:

-The congregation approved the following:

- minutes from 2023 congregation meetings,
- the 2023 Annual Report,
- recognized leaders in the congregation concluding their terms of service in 2023,
- Zach Baker and Kathy Knecht to three-year terms as Endowment Committee members, and Budgets for Epiphany and EECC for 2024.

-We heard an exciting update about our capital campaign.

- Capital Campaign Chair, Dave Hinshaw, informed the congregation about the process we've used so far.
- We were introduced to the campaign theme, Renew and Rejoice.
- Jim Pierson shared the work of the Facilities Team to identify and prioritize projects.
- Received a helpful document, included in this month's Star, that outlines the scope and phases of these important projects.

Congregation members will be needed to help with various opportunities related to Renew and Rejoice in the upcoming months.

-2023 Treasurer, Terry Wiley shared a financial report.

- Both Epiphany and EECC had a financial surplus for 2023 and are in strong financial positions.
- The congregation approved allocating Epiphany's surplus to Capital Replacement, Prior Year Retained Earnings, and to our ministry partners.

-We gave God thanks that we received 2 estate gifts in 2023.

-We were introduced to Realm, a secure, online directory for Epiphany. All Epiphany members with email addresses will be receiving an invitation to create a Realm account in the next few days. Be sure to watch your inbox and your junk/spam box for an email from <u>notifications@onrealmmail.org</u> inviting you to join Epiphany's Realm page. The invite expires in a few days so please try to log in as soon as possible after you receive the email.

Instructions on how to set up a Realm account were emailed out to all congregation members the week of January 29.

HAPPENING NOW!!! RECYCLE ALKALINE BATTERIES



Does your family use alkaline batteries?? When they are used up, do you throw them in your family trash? Right now, that's the only place we can dispose of alkaline batteries in our state. Even though alkaline batteries no longer contain lead, they still leach chemicals into the ground soil at our landfills and eventually into ground water. Bring your used batteries to the church office (place scotch tape over both ends first) and drop them into the white bucket beside the copier. When the bucket is full, it will be shipped to Terracycle company who will recycle it properly. Outreach is Planning!

2024 will be an exciting year for the Outreach Team! Epiphany's Food Ministries continue to be an active, vital part of the congregation's outreach into our community. And when we say "our community" we are not just talking about the Sherwood Forest area (which sees our outreach daily when parents are dropping off and picking up our students at our Epiphany Early Childhood Center). We extend our food ministries into the Walkertown area of Forsyth County (Ibraham Elem. School) and into Kernersville (Smith Farm Elem.), into the South Main St. area of Winston-Salem (CBC Food Pantry), and into downtown Winston-Salem (at Cities with Dwellings and Samaritan Ministries).

We are currently serving 88 students at Ibraham Elementary School with weekend bags of food and have added 32 students at Smith Farm Elementary EACH WEEK! Our food pantry at Ibraham regularly serves 12-20 families twice a month. We support CBC's community food pantry weekly as we pick up food at Second Harvest Food Bank and deliver it to CBC, unload the truck, and stock the shelves. We recently donated 80 "To-Go Bags" to The Dwelling when they opened their "White Flag" warming center during the cold weather.

All these food ministries need "people power" to pack items, deliver items, and distribute food. Unlike other food ministries, we do NOT lack funds-thanks to Joyce Kohfeldt's legacy donations to Epiphany to fund food ministries at Epiphany. The Outreach Team is planning to honor Joyce's memory by expanding food ministry programs in as many ways as we can over the next few years. Watch for "packing party" times to pack backpacks, compile Welcome Kits for Refugees, put together bags for homeless and others who need food items, and to collect and distribute other items to charities we support now and in the future. Outreach includes food ministries, Epiphany Builders, charities listed in the budget, Campus Ministry, and synod's Refugee Program. We need your ideas, your time, and your enthusiasm for doing God's Work in our Community.

The Faith of Young Children Nurtured at Epiphany Early Childhood Center

One way we partner together with families is through conferences, or parent/teacher talks. The following information is shared with families

and staff, as part of the way we share in faith development with children. Pray for us as we start a new year of ministry at EECC.

<u>The faith of young children</u> Parenting Raising Faithful Preschoolers©2001 Augsburg Fortress

Faith growth in childhood involves many central needs: for approval and support, for a sense of belonging and assurance, for involvement in family life, and for exposure to a broader world. A child's faith life can be nurtured in a variety of ways that meet those needs. A key to faith growth is to develop a child's imagination and provide an order and routine that the child can trust.

To grow in faith, children need to experience God as a gracious parent and creator of all the good gifts they have. They can be encouraged to find God in the wonders around them, and to realize that God is part of all life. Although children may not find the words to describe their idea of God, God will speak and be revealed to them in ways they can understand.

Growth in faith is also nurtured when children develop an attitude of belonging to a church family, with its rituals, symbols, and stories. This happens when children experience church as the place where they find friends, loving acceptance, and happiness: where they can celebrate God's love and care in prayer and ritual.

Children need us to talk about Jesus in very human terms, emphasizing his goodness and kindness. When telling Bible stories or speaking about Jesus:

- Emphasize Jesus' caring and love for others.
- Make his life real for them by showing they can be kind, loving, and helpful, like he was.
- Imaginatively retell favorite Bible stories to children in language appropriate for them, using situations they may have experienced and will understand.

Our challenge is to develop children's sense of awe and wonder and instill in them a sense of thanksgiving and community as we introduce them to God, our creator, and to Jesus, our Lord.


The service was very beautiful and meaningful, especially the choir and the music.

After months of planning and evaluating our facility that hosts and shapes our ministry together, we are excited to share the project list for our proposed Renew & Rejoice Capital Campaign.

We had two forums in the Fall of 2023. The first forum was on September 30, 2023, when Epiphany members were invited to discuss the current state of Epiphany's organ and future options to ensure we have an organ to help lead singing praises to God in worship. Many Epiphany members have spent countless hours maintaining and fixing the organ since it was installed in the 1970's. Recently, we discovered a potential safety hazard. We are thankful for the dedication of people throughout the years to keep our organ going, but the time has come for us to replace our organ with a new instrument that will serve us in worship for generations to come.

In October of 2023, we invited the congregation members to a presentation about our needs and sent them off to look at our facilities and make recommendations for improvements and repairs. The Capital Campaign Projects Team worked through each recommendation and determined if the need was better suited for a potential capital campaign or regular annual maintenance. An example of regular maintenance would be power washing the sidewalks.

Next the team prioritized the potential campaign projects considering safety, mitigating more long term damage, and pairing multiple projects that would help keep the overall costs down.

We are grateful for their hard work and faithfulness to this process. We are confident in their choices and on Monday, January 15, the Congregation Council voted to take the proposed list to the congregation. Our base goal for the proposed campaign includes \$1,250,000 in projects and our challenge goal is \$1,600,000.



PROPOSED PROJECTS

To help us manage cost and project implementation, the Capital Campaign Projects Committee has provided 3 Phases for our review.

PHASE 1 PROJECT LIST \$750,000

While the safety of the organ is first and foremost, our concern for implementing Phase 1 of the projects, other repairs and updates to the sanctuary will help renew our worship space and make it more inviting for members and new visitors searching for a church home. By pairing these projects we limit our overall time out of the sanctuary and the number of trips for contractors to do the work. All costs are estimated and a contingency to cover the cost of fundraising and price increases due to inflation or unexpected costs have been added to each phase.

Л Organ \$588,000

Rather than attempt to rebuild or repair the numerous issues with the existing organ, including an electrical issue, we have elected to replace the organ with a pipe organ from Lewtak Organ Builders of Mocksville, North Carolina.

Sanctuary Repairs & Contingency \$162,000

These repairs include repairing the crack in the Narthex floor, updating the pews, cushions, carpet, and hardwoods.

PHASE 2 PROJECT LIST \$500,000

Our Phase 2 Project List is included in our base goal for the potential campaign. Our parking lot has damage below the surface that requires a full replacement for future safety. In addition, we believe the other updates in Phase 2 will make us more welcoming and inviting for new visitors. They will help beautify the grounds and provide additional accessibility.

刀 Parking Lot \$182,000

Our parking lot is showing signs of failure called alligator cracks. Because a large portion of the parking lot has significant cracking that has compromised the foundation, it is necessary to repave the parking lot.

Office Windows \$175,000

There are many windows at our church home that are from the 1960's. Replacing these windows will increase our energy efficiency and lower the church's energy bills.

♬ Other Updates & Contingency \$143,000

These updates include adding building signage, adding columbarium niches, and building a walkway canopy. They also include landscaping our beds and adding solar panels to the building.

PHASE 3 CHALLENGE GOAL PROJECT LIST \$350,000

We believe we will reach our challenge goal. The projects listed here don't have immediate safety concerns, but they were projects you shared that mattered to you as members of the congregation.

Kitchen Updates \$175,000

The Fellowship Hall kitchen will be remodeled to add commercial stoves and other appliances for church gatherings and possibly new ways we could serve our neighbors.

D Other Updates & Contingency \$175,000

The Fellowship Hall and the EECC (Epiphany Early Childcare Center) floors will be replaced. New chairs will be bought for the Fellowship Hall, the office bathrooms will be updated, and we will improve our assistive listening system for the sanctuary.

The Peace Child

We, as North American Christians, take so much for granted. Most of us were born into a Christian home. Many of us had parents and grandparents who passed along the faith. Few have ever been persecuted for our Christian beliefs and values. We take for granted the fact that, on any given Sunday morning, we can wake up and make a choice about whether or not we go to worship. But allow me to share with you about a place where that has not always



not we go to worship. But allow me to share with you about a place where that has not always been the case.

The country is Papua New Guinea (PNG). The year is 1922. The first American Lutheran missionaries, Edward and Adina Piatt, with their daughter Lois, arrive in this foreign land where 800 different tribal languages are spoken. They witness a primitive culture where cannibalism is still practiced. They live and work in a place where the terms "Luther League," "WELCA" and "pot-luck suppers" are foreign words.

Fast forward to the year 1988. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is born out of a merger of three different church bodies. Part of the vision and dream is that all 65 synods of the ELCA have a companion or partner synod somewhere else in the world. The North Carolina Synod is assigned the Yabim District of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Papua New Guinea and a beautiful relationship is born. In the past 36 years, we have exchanged prayers, camp counselors, resources, and visits from our bishops and staff. And it has been the support of our congregations that has made this relationship possible.

You may be wondering what has happened in Papua New Guinea since the Piatt family arrived in 1922 to make such a relationship a reality. Today 90% of those who live in PNG are Christian. And 25% of those are Lutheran. The Lutherans are the largest Protestant presence in this country which did not gain its independence until 1975. The interesting fact about those first missionaries who arrived in 1922 is that they struggled for years and years to learn the languages and culture and build the trust level to be able to share the good news of the gospel. The first baptism did not take place for almost ten years after they arrived. And there is a very powerful, true story that is told in PNG about an experience that led to that first baptism.

It seems that in the 1930s there was still much fighting between the tribes or family clans that make up this country. The custom or tradition that led to peace was that when two tribes could not achieve peace through fighting and warfare, they would exchange a baby from one tribe to the other. In other words, when a truce was called, the first baby born in one tribe would be given to the other tribe to raise and nurture; the tribe that received the baby would do the same, giving their firstborn to the other. This custom worked through the agreement that as long as these children lived, there would be no fighting between the tribes. They called it the exchange of the "Peace Child."

Well, when the first Lutheran missionaries learned of this custom, they had an "ah-ha" experience, and a breakthrough was made. They picked up on this notion of a Peace Child, and they explained to the locals that Jesus is God's Peace Child. They shared that God gave God's only son to live and die and rise again so that we might live in peace. And since that day, millions of Papua New Guineans have come to know Jesus Christ as the "Peace Child."


