Dear Epiphany Disciples,

October is usually the time of the year when congregations prayerfully discuss financial stewardship. We believe in a God of abundance who graciously gives us everything we need to

make ministry happen in this place. When we offer our monetary gifts for ministry at Epiphany, we are putting our trust in God's call for this congregation to grow, connect, and serve. All of which is to say that while some people dread talking about financial stewardship, I get excited because it gives each of us a chance to think about how we can use our money, time, skills, and gifts to be a blessing in Jesus' name.

When a congregation is working toward a capital campaign, it is common for leaders to make sure giving towards the annual budget is also emphasized. We do so much at Epiphany and I'm so thankful for your intentional and faithful giving to support our day-to-day operations.

After discussing various options with our Finance Team, Congregation Council, and Capital Campaign Consultants, we will be doing some different things for our financial stewardship appeal for the 2024 budget. Rather than doing a separate appeal to the congregation this fall for the 2024 spending plan and another appeal for the capital campaign in late February, we're going to have one appeal for the 2024 spending plan and capital campaign.

Practically, here's what this means:

-If you are planning on increasing your giving to Epiphany for the 2024 spending plan, please consider doing so now and let Mickey Miller know. Our Finance Team is working with our various Committees and Ministry Teams to put together a responsible budget for 2024 that helps us to continue to move forward in ministry. I'm excited about what God has in store for us in 2024!

-We usually have a projection of offerings based off your intent to give cards when we present the budget for congregation approval. Because we're asking you to fill out your intent to give in late February 2024 and the congregation meeting happens no later than the end of January, we won't have those figures with the 2024 budget. With that said, we have other ways we can project offerings and will use those for this year.

-Our budget is a spending plan. While the Congregation approves the budget, we have a strong Finance Team, Congregation Council, Staff, Committee Chairs, and other leaders who do an excellent job of monitoring expenses. Over the last several years, and especially during the first years of the pandemic, our congregation has done an outstanding job of making needed adjustments to help responsibly manage our money. That will continue to be the case.

The Spirit is alive and active in this place in many ways. Thank you, people of Epiphany, for the many ways you have consistently modeled generosity. Because of you, we're able to reach more people with the good news of God's love. I'm proud to be your pastor.

On Saturday, September 30, we are gathering from 9-Noon in the Fellowship Hall for the Organ Forum. This will be an important opportunity to learn more about the condition issues, including at least one major safety issue, for our pipe organ. We will hear the various options for replacement and have a chance for open discussion.

On Sunday, October 22 after worship, we will be gathering for a light lunch in the Fellowship Hall. After lunch, we will have our Building and Grounds Forum. This will be a chance to think about the importance of our church home, hear about the work our Management Committee and Property Team have done throughout the years, evaluate the condition of our building and grounds, and prioritize potential projects for the capital campaign. You'll see a separate signup in early October.

I first met Ms. AJ in the late 90's while working as the Director of the First Baptist Children's Center. Ms. AJ had recently retired from the phone company and moved to the area to be close to Ms,



Cynthia. She may have left the phone company but she was NOT ready to sit back and watch life pass her by! I knew right away she would be a great asset, so a position in our program was created for her in the field of early childhood education! I was not disappointed! She brought professionalism and grace to the workplace. It was not long until her co-workers and friends became a growing part of a wider circle of extended family in this community. Many of the connections she made with families have continued, as children have become young adults. Families have kept in touch and shared memories of how important Ms. AJ was to the lives of their children. She was always caring, gentle and wise. Parents recall the calm supportive nature of Ms. AJ as they handed her their infants, and left them in her capable hands. She gave her students and families a second home in her heart and it showed.

When First Baptist closed, Ms. AJ came to Epiphany to support our team. Families that were displaced by the closure were comforted by her presence at Epiphany! In the summer we expand our services to include a large summer camp. "Grandma" AJ, as she was fondly called, worked with Emma Wester making our PALS camp a huge success. Her co-workers at Epiphany also grew to admire and respect her as an important member of our workplace. Even when the bus route schedule was blocks short of our door, it was never a burden for several on staff to provide transportation to ensure she got to where she needed to go. Sharing time with her one-on-one was a gift.

We will truly miss Ms. AJ, but our Heavenly Father has left us with the comfort of many wonderful memories, the fellowship of family and friends, and as we learned from Ms. AJ, the light of His presence to lead us for the days ahead.

Never Alone

Why? WHY? Anyone with a toddler knows how this question echoes—or anyone who practices science, philosophy, theology, politics, or just relationships in general.

Why implies purpose, cause and effect, and meaning. When people don't have answers, as you know, they make things up, sometimes with sincerely good intentions and sometimes to manipulate advantage. We can't ignore "Why?"

Theologically, the *why* question is the great dilemma of Christian faith itself, addressed in the book of Job, Paul's letter to the Romans, and Dostoevsky's epic novel, *The Brothers Karamozov*. We call it *theodicy*. It goes like this:

- 1. God is all-powerful, sovereign.
- 2. God is all-benevolent and loving.
- 3. Bad things, tragic things, unthinkable things, happen.

Philosophically, either God loves us infinitely but can't do anything to stop #3, or God is not all-loving and caring. God **could** change the situation, but God doesn't.

We think we must know. Why? It's why well-meaning people say frankly ridiculous and offensive things at the death of a child in defense of the God who ultimately has to make sense: "Everything happens for a reason." Or "God needed another little flower in the heavenly garden." Excuse me, but I have no use for such a God. And that's **not** the God revealed to us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

The fact is, siblings, that the deeper a crisis gets—even as our default at tragedy is always "Why?"—the less we need answers and the more we need presence. P-R-E-S-E-N-C-E. The less we need why and how and the more we need *Who*.

When a child cries out in the night with a terrible nightmare, a parent rushes in and pulls the child close. They don't launch into an explanation of why the dream isn't real. It is the child's reality in that moment. The parent doesn't explain **why** God for some larger purpose might have sent such a horrific dream. No, the loving parent simply and lovingly holds the child close, enters their trauma, rocks them, and says "It's okay, baby, Momma's here. Daddy's here. I am with you."

Our funeral liturgy has a beautifully honest prayer petition, "Help us in the midst of things we cannot understand, still to believe and trust in the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting." While answers are helpful in many contexts, they are **not** foundational to human meaning. That was the serpent's lie in the Garden. The forbidden tree was the tree of knowledge of all good and evil. Satan lied, "You'll know everything and then be like God."

God is clear, if not kind, with Job's eventual demand to know why suffering, with the underlying assumption that knowledge is ultimate power and control. God gets downright sarcastic. "Hey, Mr. Job, before I tell you, remind me...where were you when I scattered the stars and filled the oceans and raised up the mountains and set the universe in motion since you demand to know why?" In other words, it's mystery. Or as Isaiah puts it, "God's ways are higher than my ways."

While knowledge is a noble and necessary pursuit, it is not primary. Relationships are. Biblically and experientially speaking, I think we know down in our souls that relationships aren't just primary. They're everything. With God, with one another.

And Jesus comes to us not so much as the one with answers but to be for us, with us, God with skin on, to walk with us through the greatest joy and the deepest suffering, promising us that suffering will not, does not, have the last word. The worst thing is never the last thing. Our cruciform Jesus brings us a faith that hangs on to death and resurrection amid mystery, frustration, anger, emptiness, questions that receive at best a hollow echo in the void of answers as we see through a mirror dimly and yet echoes just as surely, "Nothing will separate you from the love of God in Christ Jesus." Presence. "I am with you, until the end of the age." Never alone.

Even in the deepest darkness and emptiness and hopelessness, the God who in Christ enters fully into our deepest suffering in order both fully to know it and fully to overcome it comes to us with skin on, if not with all the answers, surely in presence. Pulls us close, rocks us, comforts us, reminding us, "It's okay. Daddy's here. Momma's with you. Nothing can separate us." Amen.
